### Schedule for July :

**July 6, 7 p.m. in cafeteria: Durham Valley and its Scenic Byways.** Richard Goldstein and Nick Nahas, members of the Byway committee, will take everyone on a tour of the twenty-two miles of town and county roads in the Durham which have been designated by the State Department of Transportation as the Durham Valley Scenic Byway, tell about the history and show places you might like to visit first hand. The local Byway is a network of mostly contiguous historic roads that traverses the slope of Durham Valley between the high peaks of the northern Catskills and the Catskill Creek. All of the scenic roads have a distinct individual character. Brochures with a map will be handed out so you can take the tour yourself. Goldstein will also discuss the role of the Durham Valley Land Trust and its history.
